

INTRODUCTION

From the needs assessment done in Church Area Zone & Kisenyi II of Kamwokya in Kampala, and the Focus Discussion with the youth on the 4th of October 2016, it was concluded that the for the first phase, the youth would be taught *Briquette and Paper Bag making skills*.

On Saturday 13th May 2017, a team of Rotaractors and Rotarians from various clubs set out to Church Area Zone of Kamwokya to carry out and facilitate the project under the umbrella of the Rotaract club of Victoria University. The youth of the community had been mobilized by the secretary of Church Area Zone in Kampala. The purpose of this activity was to empower the youth with hands-on skills. This report highlights the background of the project, activity justification and the detail of the activity proceedings.

PROJECT BACKGROUND

The project was birthed, in September 2016, by Public Health Degree students at Victoria University that began with a needs assessment in Church Area Zone & Kisenyi II of Kamwokya in Kampala, a home to a sprawling slum.

The area was selected because of the public health implications of this type of settlement. It was concluded from the needs assessment that for this community, the root problem is poverty that can be tackled through youth empowerment.

Research has shown that slums exist largely because of lack of political will do anything about them, and that the residents' chances of finding formal employment are very slim because of their lack of social capital, low education levels, lack of support and networks and exclusion from 'regular society. When dealing with the issue of poverty alleviation in slum settlements, two major tactics have been identified: income generation and neighborhood improvements.

Drawing from this, a conclusion was reached that youth capacity building was to be done for the betterment of the community.

Among the partners are the Rotary Club of Victoria University and Mother Club Kampala Muyenga Breeze who provide mentorship and financial support. The other partners are Kampala Christian Caring Community and THETA Uganda who provide guidance and support.

ACTIVITY BACKGROUND AND JUSTIFICATION

Slums are informal and illegal settlement. Generally, not all their residents are poor and a few are employed by the formal sector, and others who are self-employed and own their own businesses. However, this is not the case with majority of the population who are employed in low-paying occupations.




TUPAMBANE PROJECT PHASE I REPORT.
